# Picture Books by Aboriginal Authors and Illustrators



The following list of picture books has been compiled due to their development by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. In many cases, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people are both the writers and illustrators as in publications by <u>Magabala Books</u>, Australia's leading Indigenous publishing house. In addition, other books have been developed in partnership with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

When using these books in the classroom it must be acknowledged that there is great diversity within and between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities with each text representing a specific context. Themes can be explored within students' local contexts by considering places of significance and local language/s of the area. Many of the texts contain language of a particular Country. These have been marked by \*. The context and language can be investigated with students by researching the author and illustrator and locating on the <u>AIATSIS Map of</u> <u>Indigenous Australia</u> which represents the language, social or nation groups of Aboriginal Australia. Languages can be further explored at <u>Languages Alive (AIATSIS)</u>.

In the Australian Curriculum, The Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Histories and Cultures priority uses a conceptual framework to provide a context for learning. 'The framework comprises the underlying elements of Identity and Living Communities and the key concepts of Country/Place, Culture and People.' (Version 8.4, Australian Curriculum).

To support choosing from the texts below, they have been broadly grouped based on the key concepts of Country/Place, Culture and People. This is not to say that the books only fit into one of these categories. Detail around these concepts can be found by reading about Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Histories and Cultures (Version 8.4, Australian Curriculum).

Educators will also find information from Magabala Books on <u>Teaching</u> <u>Indigenous Content</u> useful as guiding principles for using the books in classrooms. In addition, the <u>AIATSIS Guide to evaluating and selecting</u> <u>education resources</u> provides excellent advice on selecting texts and resources and core questions for evaluating resources.
