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## Picture Books: Recount Genre



The following list of picture books contain examples of the recount genre as their purpose is to recount what has happened in the past. They are commonly read and written in the English subject area.

Texts with the purpose of recounting may sound straightforward, however, recounting can take various forms. This can range from personal and factual recounts about events that have occurred in real life to imaginative recounts which recount events from the world of imagination. They also include empathetic biographies (diaries), autobiographies and biographies, as well as historical recounts and accounts which tend to be read and written when integrated with the History subject area.

Often picture books contain informative recounts at the back of the book especially if the events are based on actual events and people from the past.
